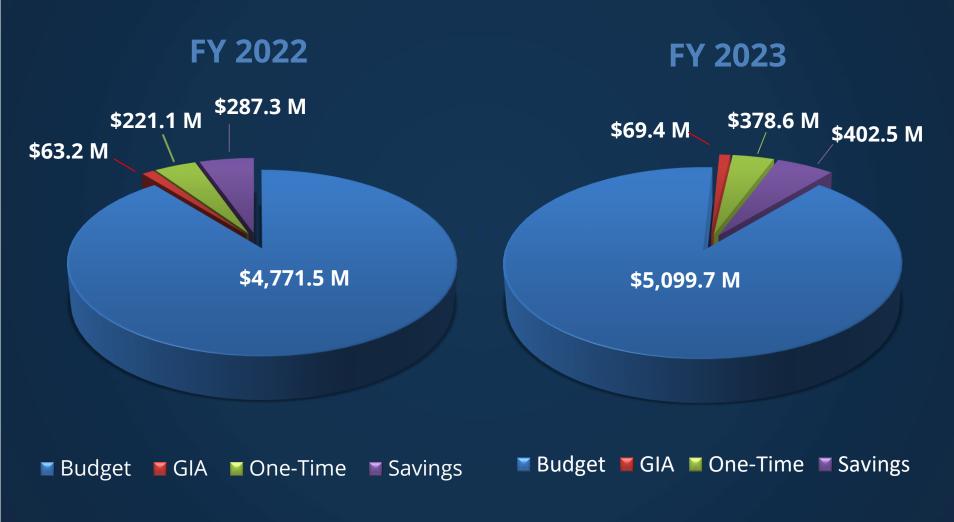

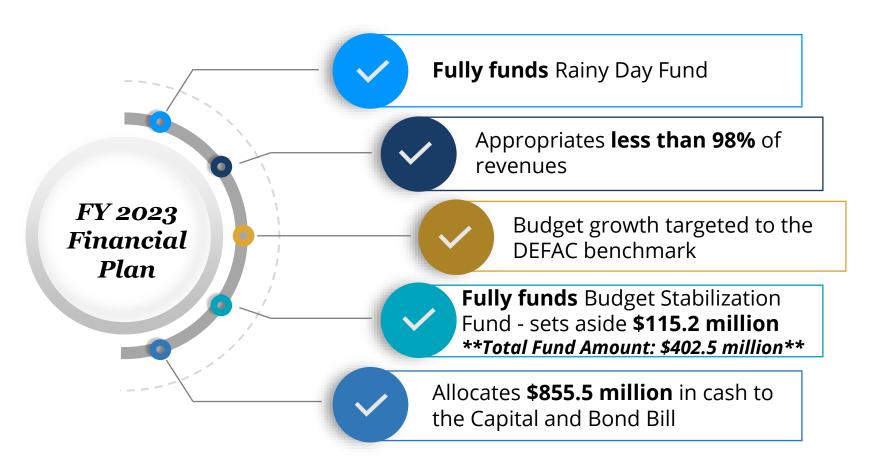




Budget Stabilization Fund is Fully Funded

Highlights of the Final FY 2023 Budget



- ✓ Continues steps towards providing compensation and pay equity for state employees.
- ✓Increases Opportunity Funding investments in our schools for low-income students and English language learners.
- ✓ Meets commitments to boost service provider funding.
- ✓ Continues record investment in clean water, economic development and fulfills our commitments to new school construction in all 3 counties.
- ✓ Completes funding to support secure and modern spaces for Kent and Sussex County courthouses and spaces.

Supporting Healthy Families



- \$20.6 million for State Share of Medicaid plus \$1.4 million for extended post-partum Medicaid coverage.
- \$20 million in increased support for childcare providers
- \$20 million for community supports for those with disabilities
- \$1.0 million to support the growth of the **Delaware** Healthy Children Insurance Program (CHIP).
- \$1.0 million to increase funding for the Health Care provider State loan repayment program.
- DHSS FY23 General Fund Budget:
 - \$1,361,270,600 (+5.6%)



Additional Investments in Health



- \$4.2 million (one time) for DHSS Technology Needs, Centralized Command Center, Security, Behavioral Health Well Check Technology, and My Healthy Community Data Portal
- \$1.5 million to develop a therapeutic foster care program (Dept. of Services for Children, Youth & Their Families)
- \$735,000 expansion of **crisis beds** in Kent and Sussex counties (*Dept. of Services for Children, Youth & Their Families*)

Related Investments in **Health**



- \$12.6 million Student Mental Health Services Contingency
- \$300,000 to permanently fund the mental health services loan forgiveness program
- \$20.8 million Paid Family Medical Leave implementation costs
- Improving health of the OPEB Trust Fund

- \$6.0 million Delaware Hospital for the Chronically III -Prickett & Candee Building Renovations
- \$5.1 million Jesse Cooper Building Improvements

Looking Ahead



- GF Revenue FY21 Actual \$5,390 M
 - 19.0% growth / 13.5% adjusted growth
- FY22 GF Revenue Estimate -- \$5,783 M
 - 7.3% growth / 16.0% adjusted growth
- FY23 GF Revenue Forecast -- \$5,814 M
 - 0.5% growth / 1.8% adjusted growth
- **FY 24 GF Revenue Forecast --** \$5,789.3
 - -0.4% growth / -1.5% adjusted growth



FY 2024 Budget Process



July -December **Governor Carney and cabinet members** develop the FY 2024 budget draft.

Delaware Economic and Financial Advisory Council (DEFAC) meets in October and December to **project revenue. DEFAC** will update their projections in March, May and June.

January

January 26: Governor Carney to propose recommended budget for FY 2024.

February -March Joint Finance Committee (JFC) and Bond Bill Committee Hearings: Committee members consider Governor Carney's recommended operating budget and hold hearings to discuss budget items with agencies and advocates.

April -May

Mark-up: JFC reviews budget proposals.

June 30

The **General Assembly passes** the budget and bond bills, and the **Governor signs** the bills by June 30.

The new fiscal year begins July 1.
