

COVID Impacts on US Economy

Calendar Year Forecasts



Overview

- \$530 million revenue forecast reduction since February
- No budget cuts.
- No layoffs or furloughs for state or schools
- Few budget increases. Focus on funding critical "door openers"
 - \$31.2 m for K-12 enrollment growth
 - \$21.8 m for salary steps/collective bargaining
 - \$8.4 m contingency for Corrections health costs
 - \$8.5 m for pupil transportation
 - \$6.6 m for 2020 Election costs and debt service
- Maintained fiscal controls (98% rule, Rainy Day Fund) and State's Triple A bond rating
- Used half of Budget Stabilization Fund to build a bridge to FY22 and mitigate potential further downturns in revenue

FY 21 Budget Highlights

Education

- Education Opportunity Funding 2nd Year
 - \$20 million weighted funding for low-income and English learners
 - \$5 million for mental health and reading support in K-5
 - \$500,00 for evaluation
- \$1.5 M continued support for Christina Schools in Wilmington
- \$205.7 M for K-12 & Higher Education Infrastructure including \$7.5 m for Wilmington initiative

Other Major Investments

- \$34.6 M for Economic Competitiveness (Strategic Fund, Research Collaboration, Higher Ed. Fund, Transportation Infrastructure Fund, RDC, DPP and redevelopment of State Strategic Sites)
- \$10 M for Open Space / Farmland Preservation
- \$13.7 M for Strong Communities (Affordable Housing, Downtown Development Districts, Museums, Parks and Libraries)
- \$47.5 M for Maintaining State facilities and assets

Additional Investments in Health

- No premium increase for state employee health care
- Bond and Capital Improvements Act
 - \$13.0 M for Clean Water Trust (\$5 M Drinking Water)
 - \$10.5 M for DHSS facilities
 - \$2.3 M for Veterans Home (Bathing rooms, generator, courtyard, and minor caps)



CARES Act Coronavirus Relief Fund Eligible Expenses

- Are Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-I9) response related;
- Were not already accounted for in the State budget; and
- Were incurred between March 1, 2020 and December 30, 2020.

Coronavirus Relief Funds cannot be used to replace state revenues lost as a result of the pandemic
